

Updates:

More than 30 people attended the UMSL Retirees Association Black History Month Zoom event in February. Our own Professor Zuleyma Tang-Martinez (retired from the UMSL Biology Department) joined Dr. Danielle Lee of the Biology Department at SIU-Edwardsville to speak about two prominent African American scientists of the past with St. Louis connections: Charles H. Turner (1867-1923) and Lincoln Diuguid (1917-2015).

Dr. Charles H. Turner was a pioneering African American biologist and scholar. Due to the restrictions of the time, Dr. Turner was "cut-off" from assuming a higher education position, hence, he taught at Sumner High School in St. Louis. Nonetheless, his research in insect behavior and physiology received international recognition.

Dr. Lincoln Diuguid taught at Stowe Teachers College (now Harris-Stowe State University).

Dr. Diuguid established Du-Good Chemical Laboratories and Manufacturers in St. Louis where he conducted research on cancer cures and other chemical inventions. His work was recognized by the St. Louis Section of the American Chemical Society and the American Cancer Society.

Updates:

UMKC Retirees Association Spring Luncheon

The annual Spring Luncheon of the UMKC Retirees Association was held on Saturday, April 9, and the event combined awards and scholarship presentations with a provocative keynote presentation titled "Am I What I Have? The Predicament of Possessions in Later Life."

The keynote speaker, Dr. David Ekerdt, is Emeritus Professor of Sociology and Gerontology at the University of Kansas and a well-known expert on retirement and its effects on health, well-being, and marital relationships. For his UMKCRA presentation, he focused on his research about how older people approach the issue of downsizing and letting go of possessions. He noted that things ("stuff," as many older people call their possessions) have a variety of meanings and that various meanings complicate the process of letting go. In the final analysis, he quipped, "the hearse has no trailer hitch," so things will have to be disposed of one way or another.

An article titled "I Spent 44 Years Studying Retirement. Then I Retired" by Dr. Ekerdt appeared last October (10/23) in The Wall Street Journal. He has also authored a book Downsizing: Confronting Our Possessions in Later Life which was published in 2020.

The remainder of the luncheon program was devoted to honoring outstanding retirees, both faculty and staff, and presenting student scholarship awards. The retired faculty recognition award was given to Dr. Jennifer Kay Martin, who spent nearly 30 years in the UMKC Theatre Department specializing in period styles of dance and movement, choreographing productions in both the department and the Missouri Repertory Theatre, presenting papers on her groundbreaking work all over the world, and traveling nationwide as advisor to young faculty in her field. Since retirement, she has mentored both faculty and students and also assisted in the development of UMKC's Emeritus College.

The retired staff recognition award was presented to Gladys Zollar-Jones, who served for 27 years as a student advisor in the School of Medicine. In retirement, Ms. Zollar-Jones has been committed to volunteering in her church and assisting in its programming for families in need, as well as serving as a medical liaison and advocate for family and friends when they face challenging situations.

Upcoming Breakfast Series Presentation on Travels to Antarctica

A May 5 offering for UMKCRA's Breakfast Series will feature Dr. Roger Pick, Professor Emeritus in the Henry W. Bloch School of Management at UMKC. Dr. Pick will share his incredible Antarctica experience in a talk titled "Over the Top Vacation at the Bottom of the World."

Summer programming for UMKCRA members and guests will include a visit to the newly renovated Kansas City Museum, which focuses on local and regional history and aspires to tell the "whole story" of Kansas City history and its multicultural roots.

UMKC Participation in Community Connect

Of interest to both retirees and the Greater Kansas City community (and beyond) are a range of programs and initiatives brought together through UM's Community Connect. Here are a couple of items involving UMKC:

- As noted in a recent report by Tripp Umbach, a nationally recognized firm specializing in economic impact studies, UMKC generated nearly \$600 million in economic impact in Missouri in 2021:
 - \$231.4 million generated by academic medicine; 2,435 jobs;
 - \$186.3 million by UMKC research; 1,300 jobs;
 - \$23.1 million by athletics; 259 jobs; and
 - \$33.4 million state and local taxes generated by UMKC.
 - Additionally, \$7.8 billion was generated in economic impact by 44,043 UMKC alumni living and working in Missouri.
- The UMKC School of Dentistry closed out February's Children's Dental Health Month strong, screening about 900 students at the University Academy, a Kansas City charter school serving K-12 students. More than 30 dental and hygiene students volunteered to provide care along with four faculty from the school. The screenings signal the reopening of a dental clinic at the school that had to be shut down during the pandemic.
